Child safety guideline for coaches

Introduction:

This guideline will help you understand the Child Safe Standards and how you can implement them as a coach of the Banyule Hawks Basketball Club.

Guidelines:

1. Create a Child Safe Environment:

As a coach, you must create a safe and secure environment for the children in your care. Ensure that you have clear boundaries, and children understand what behaviours are acceptable and what is not. Set up the environment in a way that minimizes risk (e.g., no unsupervised access to facilities, an open-door policy for meetings, and communication with parents and carers).

2. Plan and implement safety and inclusion protocols:

You should have ongoing training, education, and support for coaches to promote child safety. Make sure you have the necessary skills to identify and respond to child safety concerns appropriately.

5. Reporting and responding to allegations of child abuse:

You must ensure that you respond appropriately to allegations or concerns regarding child abuse. Report any suspected child abuse to the club's designated child safety contact, who will have the responsibility for contacting the relevant authorities.
